

FROM THE DESK OF THE CITY MANAGER

Greetings from the City Manager's Office. As the days get shorter and colder, I am reminded of how difficult last winter was for our most vulnerable homeless residents. Amid COVID-19 many doors to businesses were closed that community that may have hosted warming centers in the past were unable to do so and it left an indelible impression as yet another consequence of the pandemic.



Staff and I sought to correct this as a top priority this year with a proposal to use the Ypsilanti Freighthouse as a daytime warming center and I am happy to say this new service will begin 4 days a week and provide meals and transportation to an overnight shelter from November 2021 – March 2022. I appreciate the Shelter Association of Washtenaw County for their partnership in this new endeavor and I am looking forward to addressing this problem compassionately.

I want to remind everyone that the COVID-19 pandemic remains a very serious threat in our community and the best way we can support one another is by getting vaccinated and following state and county guidance to reduce the spread of the virus. It is so important that we work together as a community to keep one another safe and if there is anyone out there who still needs a vaccination appointment and cannot find one please do not hesitate to reach out. City Hall has returned to normal business hours so please do not hesitate to stop in and know that we are here to help. I am wishing you all a beautiful and safe Autumn season.

BLACK LIVES MATTER MURAL

Last month the Black Lives Matter mural at Riverside Park was vandalized. We are sickened by this horrible act of destruction but will not be deterred from declaring that Black Lives do matter. This is a timely reminder of all the work that remains to be done but our community will not be divided. We will overcome this and rally together to restore the mural.



PEN DAM REMOVAL



BUSINESS UPDATES

I am very excited to see two new businesses open recently at key locations in Downtown and Depot Town after many years of rehabilitation. After many years and \$10 million in renovations, the Thompson Square in Ypsilanti's Depot Town is now open. Thompson and Co feature handcrafted menus in an 11,000-square-foot space that exemplifies the historic character of the building. The Thompson Block renovation was many years in the making after a devastating fire in 2009. There are almost 50 employees now working at Thompson and Co with plans to open Mash Whiskey Bar in the other half of the building's lower level sometime in October, bringing the total number of employees to about 85. Hours of operation are 4-10 p.m. Mondays through Thursdays, 4 p.m. to midnight Fridays, noon to midnight Saturdays, and noon to 10 p.m. Sundays.



In Downtown, the Ypsi Cocktail Club opened on September 22nd after several years of building rehabilitation and the façade work at 102 W Michigan Ave. The Ypsi Cocktail Club is a tasting room associated with the Ann Arbor Distilling Company. They feature handcrafted spirits that use ingredients that are sourced locally within eight miles of their location. 100 W Michigan, the former site of Dalat, will also be opening to the public in the coming months with a new restaurant concept by the same group at 102 W Michigan.



YCS PARTNERSHIP

YCS and City of Ypsilanti is collaborating for better schools and better community. City Council recently allocated \$25,000 from state revenue sharing for recreational marijuana to Ypsilanti Community Schools with \$10,000 earmarked for the arts program and \$15,000 for sports programs. Additionally, we will be presenting "YCS a Key to the City" on Friday October 15th at the Ypsilanti Community High School football game. Come out and support your local football team and witness this historic occasion!

EDA GRANT TO SUPPORT BROADBAND INFRASTRUCTURE

Ann Arbor SPARK was recently awarded more than \$2 million in federal funding to build an underground fiber optic cable between downtown Ann Arbor and downtown Ypsilanti. The project is funded through the Economic Development Administration, which received \$1.5 billion in funding through the CARES Act to bolster post-pandemic recovery. The 20-mile stretch of underground fiber optic cable will create development opportunities for businesses in the area. Fiber optic cable will also provide a stronger internet connection for residents in those areas. The City of Ypsilanti is proud to be a partner with Ann Arbor SPARK and City of Ann Arbor on this important infrastructure project set to begin in 2022.

GFOA AWARD ISSUED TO CITY OF YPSILANTI

Government Finance Officers Association of the United States and Canada (GFOA) has awarded the Certificate of Achievement for Excellence in Financial Reporting to City of Ypsilanti for its comprehensive annual financial report for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2020. The report has been judged by an impartial panel to meet the high standards of the program, which includes demonstrating a constructive "spirit of full disclosure" to clearly communicate its financial story and motivate potential users and users groups to read the report.

The Certificate of Achievement is the highest form of recognition in the area of governmental accounting and financial reporting, and its attainment represents a significant accomplishment by a government and its management. I want to congratulate Finance Director Rhegan Basabica and his staff for the incredible work and this achievement.


220 N. PARK

September 15 - October 15 is Historical Hispanic Heritage Month: We recognized the contributions and influence of Hispanic Americans to the history, culture, and achievements in Ypsilanti and the United States.

A special "thank you" to all those who supported L.O.V.E. is the Answer Day of Reconciliation on September 17, 2021. It is a nationally every year. Our support from sponsors powered a memorable event. Many thanks to EMU, UMCLU, University Bank, and so many individuals. It was a beautiful sunny day and L.O.V.E. was truly in the air. If you couldn't make it, you missed a treat.

September was a challenging month; the escalation of violence and racism in our community raised its ugly head. Amid a time for reconciliation, building police and community relations, and promoting L.O.V.E., racism showed up boldly. While setting up the film WALKING WHILE BLACK on Thursday night September 16 in Frog Island Park, several men showed up identifying themselves as Patriots Fund US. They threatened to disrupt the showing of the film (which they did not). Then, the same group showed up in the early morning hours of Sunday September 18 to vandalize the Black Lives Matter mural at Riverside Park. They threw white paint across the lettering and tagged themselves by stenciling their group's name in red. It was impossible to remove the white paint on Sunday, but their name was not allowed to exist a day. It was spray-painted over totally and blacked out. We refuse to tolerate this behavior from insiders or outsiders as these vandals professed to be. The city workers have by now power washed their defacement. Thank you!

We must all work together to defeat racism. In all its complexity, systematic and individual racism must be rebuked. Change begins with us, as a community and individually. We can start by admitting that racism exists and monitor ourselves to examine and correct our own biases in perception. If we hear a racist remark or witness racism in any form, call it out! The person committing the deed might not even know what they are doing or saying is racist. Let's make a dent in racism and undertake the work to bring it to an end.

Our community conversations on Race and Equity are continuing to be lively and informative. If you would like to join in, please email me, I am especially interested in listening to the voices of younger people and encourage you to contact us at the information provided below.

Unfortunately, our city is suffering from a public health crisis known as gun violence. We have been experiencing too many shooting episodes and deaths. Know that we can meet with the Chief of Police, City Manager, and other officials to work towards a plan to curtail violence. Our police are working hard, but they also need our help. It is going to take all of us working together to maintain safety in our community.

MAJOR NON-MOTORIZED IMPROVEMENTS ON THE HORIZON IN YPSILANTI

Huron, Hamilton and Washtenaw – In 2022, portions of these roads that fall under Michigan Department of Transportation (MDOT) control will see repaving along with pedestrian, disabled and bicycle improvements including sidewalks, ramps, bike lanes, safety signage and traffic calming. This MDOT project will also address the need for a safe non-motorized crossing of Huron Street over the I-94 bridge.

YPSILANTI THROWBACK - PRESERVATION PLANNER SCOTT SLAGOR

This month's Ypsilanti Throwback photo shows Haab's restaurant ca. 1960, when it only occupied 18 W Michigan. The Italian-style building has been a gathering place since its construction in 1870. Its first known use was a saloon owned by James Fulton. In 1894 Adam Shaver bought the business and added tobacco sales along with alcohol. Shaver sold the business in 1905 to Charles A. Smith, who renamed the bar "Smitty's Saloon and Riverside Club." The interior was completely remodeled, including an in-vogue tiki ceiling and a "modern" bar; both exist today. Smith remained in business through the 1920s, surviving prohibition by selling soft drinks.

Prohibition ended in the early 1930s and the saloon was purchased by brothers, Oscar and Otto Haab. The Haabs shifted the saloon from an entirely alcohol-based business to a restaurant that served beer and wine with meals. Reputedly, it was one of the first alcohol-selling restaurants in Washtenaw County to emphasize their food menu over their alcohol sales. During the mid-twentieth century, increased automotive travel on US-12 was a boon to business and enabled the brothers to expand the restaurant into the neighboring building; which they did in 1963. The interior was subsequently remodeled with family heirlooms and hand-hewn beams to create a pioneer-era feel. The brothers Haab sold the business in 1976 to Mike Kabat and Harvey Glaze. In 2011 the sign over Haab's main entrance was recognized as a historic site and became an exception to the city's zoning code.

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC SERVICES NEWS

Fall has arrived and soon we will be cleaning up fall leaves. In some instances, this yard waste can be as much as 50 percent of the solid waste generated by the household during the fall months. Before you get out the rake and the blower, we want to highlight some potential alternatives to blowing, raking, bagging, and dragging those leaves to the curb. These alternatives are mulching or composting at home.



If you prefer to handle the leaves with as little effort as possible you should consider mulching. There are several advantages to mulching, according to Michigan State University Extension. The small decomposing leaf pieces provide nutrients for your lawn over the winter for quicker greening in the spring. They also cover any bare spots in the lawn that are good places for weed seeds to germinate. Michigan State University Extension has provided the following instructions for mulching your lawn:

"To mulch the leaves into your lawn, set your mower at its highest setting and mow as usual. Then mow again in the other direction, making a crisscross or ninety-degree pattern. There will be some leaf residue left on the lawn, but it will continue to break down and fall through the grass to reduce future weeds and provide those essential nutrients. After all, fall is the best time to feed your lawn. After several years, this mulching process can result in almost complete elimination of dandelions and crabgrass in some cases. If you start mulching as the first leaves begin to fall, you should only need to mow your lawn weekly. However, if a heavy wind occurs, it may require you to mulch the leaves more frequently. Leaves can be mulched up to approximately six inches deep and have good results depending on the type of lawn mower you are using."

Another option for leaf waste disposal is to use the mower to mulch and bag the leaves and use those leaves as mulch around flower beds, shrubs, trees, and vegetable gardens. The leaves will provide nutrients and reduce weeds in those areas.

Another option for leaf removal is composting. Michigan State University Extension has the following information about composting:

"Another option for leaf removal is composting. This also can be done using your lawn mower. Instead of mulching them back into the lawn, collect them in the mower bag and form a pile. Since there is probably still some lawn growth, you will get some grass clippings mixed in with the chopped up leaf debris. This is good. A good compost pile needs both carbon (leaves) and nitrogen (grass) for best decomposition. And because the leaves are chopped up into smaller pieces, they will decompose easier, giving you finished compost faster. A compost pile can be just that: a pile in an easily accessible area away from buildings and fences. Or it can be as elaborate as a three bin compost bin system where the yard waste is turned into the next bin on a temperature-dependent cycle. With either option, finished compost will be the final result!"

These alternative leaf management options will create less waste at the curb and help you improve your lawn or garden next spring. You may also save some money in the process.
