On January 28th, the Ypsilanti Fire Department hosted an event called "Aggressive Command Supports Aggressive Firefighting," presented by Nicholas Martin.

Nicholas Martin began his career in 1994 and is presently a battalion chief in Salisbury (NC), previously serving as the Chief of Training for the Columbia (SC) FD and as a lieutenant in the District of Columbia FD.



The 16-hour hybrid online/in-person incident command consisted of 8 hours of online training and 8 hours

of hands-on incident command simulations. The computer-based simulations will allow incident commanders opportunities to try

and assess new vs. current command operations while interacting with different companies assigned to the digital fireground.





UMS AT THE FREIGHTHOUSE

On January 20th, the University of Michigan Musical Society had a community arts forum in Depot Town. They discussed their future programming ideas at the historical Ypsilanti Frighthouse, allowing participants to list suggestions and ideas. The opening residencies begin on April 21st- April 30th, bringing in artists over a span of ten days to Ypsilanti but didn't mention who would be involved in this period.

Three other programming dates span over four weeks in the fall of

this year, starting September 10th to October 8th. Then in 2024, the entire month of April and September. Many residents at the art forum shared their comments and concerns about the upcoming program. UMS staff reassured those skeptical that plans are to embrace the current art scene within the community while including other programs that are not currently available.

SNOW ORDINANCE AND ABATEMENT PROCEDURES

TO ALL CITY OF YPSILANTI PROPERTY OWNERS

The city's snow ordinance and abatement procedures are now in effect. Please be advised of the following:

1. Snow must be removed from sidewalks and parking lots within 24 hours of first accumulation of one inch (1") or more.

2. Ice must, if practicable, immediately be removed from sidewalks and parking lots. When immediate removal is impracticable,

sand, salt or other chemical or materials must immediately be used and then ice must be removed as soon as practicable.

3. Only one (1) warning for abatement will be left at any parcel per snow season. Further violations will result in abatement without additional notices left at the property. The property owner/agent is responsible for abatement costs.

4. A citation will be issued for every violation, even the first. Fines increase each offense.

5. A five-foot (5') path must be maintained on sidewalks at all times to be in compliance. (Properties with public sidewalks less than 5' in width must be cleared to the edges of the paved areas). Ypsilanti City Code Chapter 94, Section 94-135(a) defines the "snow season" as October 1st

through May 31st. Failure to comply with the abatement notice will result in the city's contractor being hired to correct the violation, with all costs for services invoiced to the property owner/ agent.

ARTS COMMISSION

SOLAR REBATE PROGRAM

Residents can get at least a \$2,000 rebate for installing solar panels on their homes or business. There is \$80,000 available for rebates for anyone interested, that's enough to accommodate 40 different homes. The project has been named the Grace Sweeny Solar Rebate program and is named for the late Ypsilanti resident and wife of longtime city leader Pete Murdock.

To the businesses in Downtown and West Cross Street, the DDA has made available \$150,000 in solar rebates.

REMINDER: RECYCLING ITEMS ACCEPTED FOR CURBSIDE PICK-UP

Items Accepted Curbside:

PLASTIC: Clean and Rinsed Bottles, Jars, and Containers with numbers 1 (PET), 2 (HDPE), 5 (PP), on the bottom

- No plastic bags or plastic film
- No plastic bottle caps, lids, or straws
- No motor oil bottles

METAL: Aluminum, Tin, & Steel

- Includes cans, beverage and product containers, foil, & trays.
- Please clean.

PAPER


- Bundle paper separately with string or place in paper bags or cardboard boxes
- Paper may be placed next to red bin, but don't block the view of the bin
- NO shredded paper

NEWSPAPER, MAGAZINES & JUNK MAIL

- Newspapers, including glossy inserts
- Magazines and paperback books, including phone books
- Mixed paper, glossy coated OK
- NO plastic or metal tabs, binders, transparencies, carbon paper, or tissue paper

CARDBOARD & BOXBOARD

- Bundle in 3x4 foot bundles or in a box or bag
- Place next to or on top of bin
- Cereal boxes, cardboard egg cartons and similar type material



CONT. RECYCLING

- Flatten and remove inner bags or packaging
- Rinsed and empty boxboard containers without wax coating or food residue

PAPER (ASEPTIC) CARTONS/GABLED CONTAINERS

- Must be rinsed and empty
- No straws or caps


GLASS

- Clean and rinsed bottles and jars of any color only.
- No other glass products.

- No plastic bags or film
- No Styrofoam
- No shredded paper
- No batteries
- No household trash, food, or yard waste
- No electronics
- No motor oil, transmission fluid or antifreeze
- No material with excess food residue, other organic material, or moisture (example: paper drink cups, pizza boxes, or take-out food boxes)
- Please do not bag recyclables!

Items not accepted curbside, including oversize items, may be taken to Recycle Ann Arbor's Drop-Off station. Check their website at recycleannarbor.org or call (734) 971-7400 for a current list of items they accept. The City of Ypsilanti residents can get a pass at the City Hall Clerk's office to waive the standard entrance fee; fill out the form at cityofypsilanti.com/RAAForm to request a card.



YCUA CONSTRUCTION UPDATE



Public Notice- December 22nd

As part of the ongoing dedication to provide top quality, cost effective, and environmentally safe water and wastewater services to our customers, YCUA continues to make improvements to both existing water and wastewater utilities within the M-17 and US-12 corridors in the City of Ypsilanti. The improvements are being constructed for YCUA by DiPonio Contracting, Inc., of Shelby Township, Michigan. OHM Advisors,

Inc. of Livonia, Michigan is administering the construction contract and providing full-time, on-site observation of the work by DiPonio on behalf of YCUA.

YCUA's utility improvements north of Michigan Avenue were substantially completed during early December and construction work has concluded for the winter months. Note that the work completed this year included Huron Street from Michigan Avenue north to Cross Street, an area that was initially expected to not be started until early spring of 2023. Some minor clean up and restoration work, such as grass seed, will need to be completed by YCUA's contractor in the areas north of Michigan Avenue next spring.

The final phase of YCUA's project will be within or adjacent to Michigan Avenue from Huron Street west to Ballard Street. The scope of work has been revised from the original plan to abandon the existing water main in Michigan Avenue between Huron Street and Washington Street as well as between Adams Street and Hamilton Street. Most properties along the south side of Michigan Avenue between Huron Street and Washington Street will have their water services relocated to an existing water main in the parking lot south of the buildings. Properties along the north side of Michigan Avenue between Washington Street and Adams Street will have their water services connected to an improved water main in the alley and



parking lot north of the buildings. Properties along the south side of Michigan Avenue between Washington Street and Adams Street will be reconnected to a new water main installed under the eastbound lanes of Michigan Avenue. The revised scope of work will lessen disruption to traffic flow along Michigan Avenue. Although every effort will be made to minimize disruptions caused by the water and wastewater system improvements, the construction work will invariably result in some inconveniences.

Similar to the first phases of the project, the Michigan Department of Transportation (MDOT) will follow YCUA's construction into Washtenaw Avenue, Hamilton Street, and Huron Street to resurface or repair those portions of the pavement not impacted by YCUA's project. MDOT will then follow into the Michigan Avenue corridor following completion of YCUA's utility work.

YCUA is participating with Washtenaw County in utilizing its Everbridge Notification System. Everbridge is a secure and identity-certified communication service that allows public safety and service organizations throughout the county to connect with local residents over cell phone, email, and the internet. YCUA is utilizing this service for directly issuing emergency notices to impacted customers regarding water main breaks and boil water advisories. The Everbridge System will allow YCUA to directly reach out to enrolled customers regarding emergencies that impact their water service with current and detailed information.

Signing up for the service will also allow customers to stay up-to-date on happenings in their neighborhood through email and text messages sent by the Washtenaw County Sheriff's Office. Please visit www.washtenaw.org/alerts to sign up today!

prior years when we reviewed applications on a rolling basis.






