FROM THE DESK OF THE CITY MANAGER

Greetings from the City Managers' Office. Can you believe already March? Spring is right around the corner, and the official first day of the new season is March 20th. The days are getting longer, and the colder days are becoming fewer, and what a freeing feeling. I want to thank the Washtenaw County Shelter Association for all their efforts with our warming centers within our city, that being everyone involved. We're fortunate for all the steps provided to our community, especially those lacking food or shelter in these colder months.

March is designated as Women's History Month to celebrate the contributions and achievements of women throughout history. Here in Ypsilanti, we have leaders who are incredible women who contribute to our community. The month provides an opportunity for individuals, communities, and organizations to pay homage to the women who have made a significant impact in their respective fields and to inspire future generations of women to strive for greatness.

City Council has completed its goals for 2023. Along with the goal sessions, now we're in the process of finalizing the 2023/24 Fiscal Year budget, with entails meeting with each Department Head. The method of goals and budgeting is vital for our community, which we all care about tremendously. Our Credit Rating for our General Obligation Long Term Debt is now rated A1. The partnership with UMS and the Ypsilanti Freighthouse has announced their line-up for the Pilot Program week of April 22nd-29th. Tickets and registration will be available on Tuesday, March 14, for Ypsilanti residents and will open up more broadly on Tuesday, March 28. The construction will begin again shortly within our community. The Ypsi Road Renovation project is nearing completion or halfway complete. This year, the plan is to restore the water mains on Michigan Avenue, like last year, the repairs on Hamilton and Huron; remain patient and know that this is temporary. Plenty of events are happening within our community; please refer to our [city calendar](#) for updates on getting involved. If you're looking to [host a free community event](#), the Ypsilanti Freighthouse has a community events policy to make the space available free of charge.

Washtenaw County has moved into a "low" COVID-19 community level. CDC guidance at this level doesn't include broad masking recommendations. People can wear a mask based on preference or risk at all levels. People with symptoms, a positive test, or exposure to someone with COVID-19 should wear masks. Please continue to use available, effective strategies to prevent and reduce the spread of illness in our



community, including:

- *Get vaccinated and stay up-to-date on your COVID-19 vaccines - including your updated booster! ([vaccinefinder.org](#))*
- *Seek testing if you are feeling ill or if you have been exposed. Stay away from others if you are feeling ill or recently exposed, waiting for test results, or have tested positive. If you test positive, talk to your doctor right away about treatment options to prevent severe illness.*
- *Avoid contact with people who have suspected or confirmed COVID-19. If you're exposed to someone with COVID, wear a mask around others, monitor symptoms, and test 5 days after exposure ([washtenaw.org/covid-19whattodo](#)).*
- *Maintain improved ventilation throughout indoor spaces when possible.*
- *Use increased precautions if you are at higher risk of severe illness or if you live with or are frequently around someone who is high risk. [Read more here.](#)*

CITY UPDATES

BILL ANHUT MEMORIAL FIELD WINS DESIGN AWARD

City of Ypsilanti Parks & Recreation's Bill Anhut Memorial Field has been selected as a 2022-2023 Park Design Award Winner by the Michigan Recreation and Park Association (mParks). The award will be presented at the 2023 mParks Conference & Trade Show at the Lansing Center on Wednesday, March 8, 2023.

Waterworks Park, located in the City of Ypsilanti, is home to the recently restored Bill Anhut Memorial Field, serving the community through the Ypsi-Arbor American Little League (YALL). The league experienced an increase from 180 to more than 350 players and needed another field to support the expansion. The transformed diamond not only fulfilled the demand for more space but also allowed the league to offer a softball program for the first time.

Before its refurbishment, the backstop was engulfed in vines and the infield was overgrown with grass and weeds. Thanks to a generous donation from the Anhut family and efforts of Nicole Wimmert and Chip Peterson of YALL,



a new vibrance has been brought back to the field. Over the course of several work days, 140 volunteers removed and installed new fencing, replaced dugout benches, resurfaced the infield, and installed bases. The Waterworks field restoration created more opportunities for organized youth sports and has brought hundreds of people back into the park.





SOLAR REBATE PROGRAM



Residents can get at least a \$2,000 rebate for installing solar panels on their homes or business. There is \$80,000 available for rebates for anyone interested, that's enough to accommodate 40 different homes. The project has been named the Grace Sweeney Solar Rebate program and is named for the late Ypsilanti resident and wife of longtime city leader Pete Murdock.

GET TAX CREDITS FOR WORK ON HOMEOWNER-OCCUPIED HISTORIC PROPERTIES

If you are the owner and occupant of a house that contributes to the local historic district or to the National Register district and you are doing work on the house, you may be eligible to receive up to 25% of your

BRUSH AND BRANCE PICKUP



The City of Ypsilanti will be doing a special curbside brush and branch pickup the week of March 6th, 2023, due to the 2/22 ice storms.

Branches must be at most 4 inches in diameter and 4 feet long. For

branches and logs more than 4 inches in diameter, please cut into segments weighing at most 50 pounds.

Please place it along the curb or with the cut side facing the curb. For brush, please use natural-fiber rope or twine


(no plastic or wire) to tie into bundles no more than 4 feet long and 50 pounds.

If your regular trash pickup is Monday or Tuesday, please have your brush curbside by 6am on Tuesday, March 7th.

If your regular trash pickup is Wednesday, Thursday, or Friday, please have your brush curbside by 6am Friday, March 10th.

We thank you for your patience as our crews continue to work to clear debris from the roads, sidewalks, parks, and other public rights of way throughout the City. Please continue to report any downed lines to DTE at 1-800-477-4747 and stay at least 25 feet away from any downed power lines.

from prior years when we reviewed applications on a rolling basis.



NEW DETROIT-CHICAGO DAILY SERVICE

Indian Trails Launches New National Bus-Ticketing System, Announces New Detroit-Chicago Daily Service

Indian Trails, Inc.—one of the largest fleets of deluxe motorcoaches in Michigan—launched the new national bus-ticketing system developed by Transcor Data Services (TDS).

OCED WEATHERIZATION ASSISTANCE PROGRAM

The Weatherization Assistance program provides free weatherization services to qualified Washtenaw County residents. The program is implemented through Washtenaw County in partnership with the U.S. Department of Energy (DOE) and is designed to help residents lower their utility bills. We perform a free energy audit, and based on the results of that audit, we provide eligible repairs on the home for free. Homeowners and renters that meet the eligibility requirements are welcome to apply.

Free home improvements could include:

- Insulation in the attic, walls, and crawl-spaces
- Furnace and water heater inspections and repairs
- Caulking around drafty windows and doors
- Inspections and replacements for inefficient refrigerators
- Weather-stripping around doors and attic accesses

Here are the current income guidelines for the program:

- Your household must be at or below 80% AMI of the federal poverty level to qualify for the Weatherization Assistance Program. Income eligibility is based on the household's previous three months' income.
